Journalist: Our guest today is Clint Buffington who has found more than 80 messages in bottles washed up on beaches and decided to track down their senders. Clint, how did this unusual pastime begin?

Man: At 22 I was holidaying in the Turks and Caicos Islands. On one of the beaches, I saw a bottle with a slip of paper in it. I still remember the shivers that ran through me when I was uncorking it. It turned out the bottle had been dropped eight months before by a couple on board a ferry. It wasn't a treasure map or a cry for help, but it was a miracle because the bottle had survived its journey across the Atlantic and I had come across it. I felt as though I was in a film. I thought things like that only happen in children's dreams. But it was real. That experience sparked a sort of obsession and I began spending every spare moment looking for more bottles.

Journalist: And how do you track down the senders?

Man: The Internet has made it easier than it would have been in the past and I often get help through my blog *Message In A Bottle Hunter* and my *Facebook* page. Besides, people who write the messages, often leave some clues about themselves, so I'm a bit like a detective, checking information or calling places. For example, to find the lady who said she was the owner of a motel in New Hampshire I contacted the local Chamber of Commerce and the Tax Department for help.

I eventually learnt she had died, but I met her daughter, who was astonished when she saw the message her mother had sent decades before.

Journalist: **How do people respond when you contact them?**

Man: Well, I remember one couple who were delighted with their cruise, but felt disappointed that the bottle had been found so soon after they had dropped it overboard. There are people who have forgotten about sending a message in a bottle. But most of those who remember are willing to talk to me. One person even invited me to his place for a week. Sometimes, it can be funny, too. I remember making a phone call to a woman whose contact details I found in a bottle. They were in a message from someone who claimed that he had been taken prisoner “by a grumpy old man”. It turned out that it was her son who had sent the bottle while he was on a boat trip with his dad.

Journalist: **Is there a perfect spot for finding bottles like this?**

Man: To my mind, the Turks and Caicos are a paradise for message seekers. Hundreds of bottles have washed up on the islands since the 1800s and they come on ocean currents from across the world. It seems the islands work like a magnet drawing the bottles in. A retired geography teacher even founded a museum there. His impressive collection of bottles is available to the public, and plenty of visitors inspired by the exhibits head for the beaches hoping to find more messages.

Journalist: **And one more question. How meaningful is bottle hunting to you?**

Man: I’m hooked. I love the thrill. Even if you are knowledgeable about oceanography, you never know where bottles will wash up, so every find is a treasure. On a deeper level, I guess it is about finding connections. I have picked up bottles from senders from the entire world. I love it when someone tosses a bottle into the sea in the hope that a person they have never met, in a place they may never have visited, might one day find it. That’s fascinating.
